The cadets here receive 32 college credit hours. And we encourage them to finish up their education, which they can do 100 percent online to achieve their Associate's degree. So we are, you know, really strongly trying to make law enforcement more academic and allow them to achieve their goals.

Currently we are going to have two cert by waiver academies and another telecommunicator academy in September along with the basic academy. So that just gives you a little history on what we're about here.

This is not a violation of law, there was no allegations of theft or dishonesty during the investigation or anything like that. It was an investigation as to where the property went. I would be happy to answer any questions from the Board.

MR. COON: Mr. Rightsell, were you asked to take a polygraph?

MR. RIGHTSELL: I was.

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MR. COON: And why did you not take the polygraph?

MR. RIGHTSELL: As I explained earlier, I had made the decision to leave the department in August after I found out that my wife was having an inappropriate relationship with a coworker. I started applying to multiple other agencies.

I went through the entire IA process and cooperated 100 percent fully. When it came time that I was offered a position with another agency, I went ahead and took that position. Again one incident didn't have anything to do with the other. I just felt that I couldn't work for that department because of the family issues that I was involved with.

MR. KORN: Chief Schultz.

MR. SCHULTZ: Mr. Chairman, Mr. Rightsell, why did you leave the Valencia County Sheriff's Department?

MR. RIGHTSELL: Why did I leave the Valencia County Sheriff's Department? I was terminated while on probation after the election of the new sheriff.

MR. SCHULTZ: It was not related to any specific incident?

9 MR. RIGHTSELL: Absolutely not, absolutely 10 not.

MR. KORN: Anybody else? Yes, Chief Betz. MR. BETZ: Mr. Rightsell, is there anything that validates that you had returned the property to the owner, the CDs?

MR. RIGHTSELL: Well, the DVDs or the CDs or -- there was three incidences. Anything that validates the return of the DVDs to the owner, no. And the reason for that was this was a large case in which a lot of property was recovered.

When I contacted the victim, he was embarrassed by the fact that they were pornographic DVDs. He initially told me he did want to be listed as a victim. Understanding his position in the community, I went ahead and booked that property in. But I didn't list his name as a victim.

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When that case was resolved successfully, I received prosecution and conviction on all of those subjects, when we started releasing the property back to the rightful owners, I personally released that property back to him, back to the original owner.

However, because I had never done an incident report listing him as a victim in the initial portion of the investigation at his request, there was no supplement done on the backside of that. I did notify the property clerk that I had returned that property. Therein that was the issue that I had. I failed to do the report indicating what I had done.

I thought I was doing the right thing by keeping his name out of it. It was a sensitive nature. I mean who would really want to go to court and testify that they had pornographic DVDs stolen from their residence.

This was also in conjunction with working with the District Attorney's Office on this as to what we were going to charge, what crimes. Because that was a misdemeanor larceny, that case was never -- was never prosecuted. We stayed with all the felony charges and received the prosecution on that.

So this incident did not have any negative impact on any criminal cases or convictions or

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1 anything like that. It was property that we took for 2 safekeeping, property that I released back, which in 3 accordance with our policy at the department, which I 4 have a copy of here for you today if you would like to 5 look at it, allows me to return that property.

So it wasn't necessarily a mishandling of evidence. It was the not doing the report. That's where I was wrong.

In this particular case, we had a lot of property that was released as the case went. Everything that was considered -- that was going to be

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a misdemeanor crime, we released that property right back. The cell phones, there was a dozen cell phones that had been stolen.

All of those phones were actually converted to department use with the authorization of the phone company and the department. So that left me with the pornographic DVDs with no name for them to be tied to, no case for them to be tied to.

So what I did is, when we transferred the cell phones to department use, I returned those CDs back to the individual.

MR. BARNCASTLE: Mr. Chairman.

13 MR. KORN: Sir.

MR. BARNCASTLE: Mr. Rightsell, is this a common practice by the Roswell Police Department, to take items into safekeeping and then not prepare supplemental reports on them, has this happened before?

MR. RIGHTSELL: It has happened before. There are instances in which detectives -- and I was a detective at the time. Where we come across property and we'll release it back to the owner right out of the office or what would be considered a field release.

Not all property is always booked in all the

time. There are exceptions for everything. And our policy allows for that to occur.

MR. BARNCASTLE: So this was not evidence?
MR. RIGHTSELL: No. It was just safekeeping.
It was safekeeping. It was never used in any criminal proceeding. And again the only reason it was done in the fashion that it was was at the request of the owner.

Because of the sensitive nature, he didn't want his name associated with those particular items and he did not want to be a victim. He didn't want to be listed in any reports, which we all know are public. So I was trying to do the right thing by complying with his request.

MR. BARNCASTLE: So these were items that were not seized but they were turned over to you?

MR. RIGHTSELL: They were recovered.

MR. BARNCASTLE: They were recovered.

MR. RIGHTSELL: Yeah. As the course of the investigation went on, we were able to find the suspects. And the suspects voluntarily -- they were all juveniles. They were all juveniles that had gone around and stolen packages off of people's porches, UPS packages and such.

So when we got on their trail and were able

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to work the case, their parents turned in the property
 and things like that. There was never any search
 warrants done for this property or anything like that.
 There was absolutely no paper trail as it pertained to
 these items or any other items.

MR. BARNCASTLE: I think I'm aware of that case now, I know which one you're talking about. Thank you.

MR. KORN: Any other Board Members? I have a couple questions, Mr. Rightsell.

MR. RIGHTSELL: Sure.

MR. KORN: You have explained the DVDs. What about the cell phones, were they part of the same case?

MR. RIGHTSELL: No. That was a separate case. The cell phone was originally recovered by another officer in a criminal sexual communication with a minor case. That case had no leads. I worked it.

I even checked that phone out to photograph it, process it, return it to evidence, rechecked it out with the authorization of my supervisor in an attempt to make contact with the suspect.

So for a period of about five days, I had that cell phone secured in my office trying to make

contact with the suspect. I was never able to make good contact with the subject or progress in that case. That phone was ultimately returned to property.

I have a letter here from Detective Jeff

Prince, who was a TSU detective, which is like a crime scene detective. He's a processing officer for evidence. In his letter, which I'll make available to the Board, it says, "In reference to the missing cellular phone, I assisted Officer Rightsell in photographing the phone and its images. A few days later, on April 5th, 2012, myself and Officer Rightsell both walked from the office to the property room, where I watched Officer Rightsell hand the phone over to the property clerk. Myself and Officer Rightsell then left the building and went to lunch."

In our organization detectives handle property over the counter I guess would be the best way to explain it. So if I wanted your water bottle for property, you would give me that as the property clerk. It would be your responsibility to log that into my custody. When I give it back to you, it's your responsibility to log it back in.

There is no log of that being logged back in. However, I did turn it in. I made that aware. I had another officer with me when I turned it back in. He

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made it aware to the Internal Affairs investigator. MR. KORN: So you were never accused of keeping the cell phone?

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MR. RIGHTSELL: Absolutely not, no. MR. KORN: And if I read this correctly, the

cell phone was found in the property area?

MR. RIGHTSELL: I have not been privy to any of that information. So I don't know what the status of that is.

MR. KORN: The syllabus we received says the cell phone was recovered.

MR. RIGHTSELL: Okay.

MR. KORN: But it says that you pointed to it in the desk.

MR. RIGHTSELL: Yes. She came up to check if I had the property. I had the property. I had the property because I was trying to make contact with a suspect.

19 MR. KORN: That was before you turned it back 20 in?

21 MR. RIGHTSELL: Yes.

> MR. KORN: So the communication in here that it's in the desk was actually during the time that you were investigating the case and before you turned it back in?

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1 MR. RIGHTSELL: Yes. With my Commander 2 Stevenson's approval. I had gone to him and said, 3 hey, I would think that the only way we're going to get this guy is if I can make contact with him posing 4 5 as 13-year-old female. I tried to do that. I wasn't 6 very successful in it. The phone was returned to 7 property.

MR. KORN: And the CDs and cases that were a part of this?

MR. RIGHTSELL: The CDs and cases were from a third incident. What they were were a -- I took them as evidence on a vehicle burglary as a patrol officer. They were broken, the cases, where somebody had left them in the seat of a car and then kneeled on them.

I took them to be processed for evidence for fingerprints on the vehicle burglary. They were turned into property. I have the property sheets here where they were booked in. I'll make that available to you. It's got my signature on it and it's got the locker number they were assigned to they went in.

Also again, in a letter from Detective Prince, who is the property technician who is responsible for handling this, he says, "In October 2011, while working in TSU and handling the evidence, I personally observed three MPM broken CD

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cases referenced in the complaint. They were present in the processing room. And although I did not process these, they were booked in contrary to the IA complaint."

So they had made it all the way into the processing room. Where they went after that I don't know because I have no contact with them. I don't operate in that portion of the building, I don't have access to it.

MR. KORN: So did you take them out after that?

MR. RIGHTSELL: No. Absolutely not. I had nothing to do with them ever again. As a matter of fact, those came up missing -- I was first asked about those a year ago. So this has gone on. They had known that these items had been misplaced for over a year prior to me ever being asked about them.

MR. KORN: What happened with that particular case?

MR. RIGHTSELL: There was no leads in that case.

MR. KORN: And then the IA investigation that was done on you, how did that resolve?

MR. RIGHTSELL: It was sustained. And according to the letter that I received, it was

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sustained because I left the employ of the Roswell Police Department. It was not for cause or not as a result of the investigation. Since I accepted

employment with another agency, they closed it and sustained it.

MR. KORN: Okay. And you said there are certain documents that you wanted us to have as part of this?

MR. RIGHTSELL: Well, if you would like to see any of the documents I have here.

MR. KORN: Well, Mr. Rightsell, if you would, during one of the breaks, perhaps you can talk to Director Byrd and see if you can get those photocopied so we'll have those and you'll have your originals.

MR. RIGHTSELL: Yes, sir.

MR. KORN: Any other questions?

MR. COON: I've got one question. This case had lane dormant basically for a year?

MR. RIGHTSELL: Yes, sir.

MR. RIGHTSELL: No. I left the employment of the Roswell Police Department because my wife was having an affair with another member of the organization. So I decided that wasn't a good place for me to be anymore.

MR. KORN: Okay. Very good. Other Board Members, any questions? No. Okay Mr. Rightsell, thank you for coming.

MR. RIGHTSELL: Thank you.

MR. KORN: Mr. Rosales.

MR. ROSALES: First I would like to say thank you for allowing me the opportunity to speak to you today. I'm very embarrassed to be standing in front of you today. I would just like to explain to you what happened.

This incident actually originated on December 8th, which was Friday. On this day I learned that my fiancee of ten years -- she's a nurse in Santa Fe. She was having a three-year long affair with a guy that she works with.

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I learned that night that she had an apartment up there, a dog, you know, everything. And also the \$500 for a student loan that I was giving her she was using to help fund that apartment.

That night I left, got my things, moved out. We were staying with her mom. She had recently moved out of our house because of problems. She has a 15-year-old son who is very violent. And she called me back to stay with her because she feared for her kid's safety. I was the only one who could control

That Friday night I moved out after learning of this. No violence. I'm not a violent person at all. I didn't know about the affair, everything that had happened. That weekend was the state football championship. I'm from Silver City. It was St. Michael's High School. All of her family was coming up.

And, of course, I was in charge of the barbecue. She had begged me to come back, we'll talk about it, just to be civil for the weekend because all her family is going to be here and put on a happy face for her family. I agreed to. I shouldn't have. The whole weekend was -- you know, it was hard to be there in that situation. But the whole weekend I was just

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thinking about what I needed to do.

That Sunday afternoon I was sitting down with her brother. We were watching the Cowboys football game. I was drinking a couple beers with him, a few beers with him. He left probably about five o'clock. He lives in El Paso. I didn't consume any alcohol after that.

It was probably around nine o'clock at night when I decided that I was going to pack my things and move out, when I was going to see my daughter and my other three stepkids I call them, but see them all off to school, not to make any kind of a scene.

Like I say she's a nurse at the hospital in Santa Fe. And she takes Ambien. It's a hypnotic sleeping aid. She's also on antidepressants. And she was drinking with her family members that day as well.

It was about nine o'clock and I decided to log in our system and take the day off. I didn't want to make a scene with the kids. I wanted them all to be gone and I was going to move out. And I had in my mind already that I was going to get a temporary order to remove my daughter from the home until she figures out what to do with this oldest son.

Approximately -- it was about two in the morning. I was laying in bed and I couldn't sleep at all. I was tossing and turning. It was about two in the morning. She got up and yelled at one of her kids. She took her Ambien medication. I thought she was out.

It was probably about three. I got out of bed. I couldn't sleep at all. I had not drank anything since about four or five o'clock that afternoon. I had already called off to work because I was going to move out the next day.

I did go to the kitchen. I did drink a small glass of Crown Royal, I don't know, just a small amount. I couldn't even tell you how much. Immediately after that I went back to the bedroom.

I had -- originally I was going to go to work. I had my gun belt there, my uniforms all laid out. When I was getting into bed, I knocked over my handcuffs and they fell and hit the table. She awakened.

And when she woke up, she asked me what's going on. I told her nothing, I don't want to talk about it. She could barely talk. When she takes this medication, she has memory loss, she engages in sexual activity, she walks around in her underwear outside, makes phone calls, overeats. I mean it's like dealing with a heavily intoxicated person.

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I told her did not want to talk about it. I didn't want to explain to her what was going on at the time. She insisted, she kept pushing the issue. I finally told her I'm going to leave, I'm moving out. And I'm going to take my daughter with me.

Prior to that she had mentioned some other things, she started -- we weren't arguing at all.

There was no yelling, no argument, nothing. When I told her that I was leaving, I was going to take my daughter, she laughed. She said no, you're not. She said she's not your daughter. She's six years old.

When she said that, I'm not going to lie, it cut me down to the bone. And at that point is when I had my -- my duty belt was right there. And I did put the gun to my head for a brief second. And she laughed. She smirked, she laughed, she picked up the phone, dialed 911.

I immediately dropped the mag, unloaded it. And she said -- she was on the phone with dispatch. Never any yelling, never any screaming, crying, nothing. She told dispatch that I was going to shoot myself. And I had already dropped the gun at that time. She says give it to me.

I gave her the gun. She hung up the phone. She walked to her daughter's bedroom. I later went in there. I said give me back my gun. She gave it back to me. And I went and I holstered it. And I left the round in the mag on the floor. And I went to bed. She was sleeping with her daughter. She came back in. I apologize.

A few minutes later the officers arrived. When they came into the room, I was embarrassed. I thought, you know, that I was going to go to the hospital. And I was going to -- it was going to be an embarrassing moment for me. Because that's our standard operating procedures, to be taken to the hospital. That's what I was expecting.

When they asked me to get out of bed, when I stepped out of bed, there was an officer there. I stepped with my heel on the round that I had ejected. When I stepped on it, I kicked it to the side. It was right next to the mag.

When the officers came in and they separated, lieutenant -- I don't mean to say his name. But the lieutenant that came in, as soon as he walked in the door, he gave me this look. And this same lieutenant -- a couple of months before there was an investigation done on him where they asked me to lead the investigation where he was on duty joyriding in a borrowed Polaris side-by-side ATV with another

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lieutenant.

They ended up wrecking the vehicle when he wasn't supposed to be there. So the captain asked me to investigate that. I found the crash. He ended up getting disciplined for it.

And when he walked in, he gave me this look, you know. And I just -- you know, I didn't know what to think. And so I was sitting in the kitchen. The officer that was there, he asked me if I had consumed any alcohol. I told him that I had drank a couple beers earlier in the day.

The next thing I know he comes in -- well, I could hear him talking to Leslie. And when she wakes up from this medication, it takes her about a good two hours to really understand what's going on. And I heard her at one time say no matter what I tell you, you're not going to stop asking me until I tell you he did something.

And he says, well, I believe you're just covering up for him. They ended up shutting the door. I was standing there. I was expecting to go to the hospital. They come in and tell me I'm under arrest. And they stuck me with all these different charges. And I was shocked. I couldn't believe what was going on.

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And they took me straight to jail, straight to the holding facility, straight to jail. They gave me a breath test at the station. I blew a 0.03. They were on the news saying that I was drunk. I didn't appreciate that at all. And it was very embarrassing for me.

When I got ahold of the police report, you know -- well, before that I was telling the lieutenant I sat there and I heard you -- heard her give you all these different stories. One statement she gave an officer was that I gave her the gun and I later walked back in and she gave it back to me, which is what happened.

Another statement she told the officer was that she never touched the gun because she was scared and didn't know what to do with it. Another statement she said she got the gun, wrapped it in a blanket, and left it with me on the bed.

One statement she said that I walked into the room and she woke up when she heard a noise. Another statement said that she heard the TV on, went in there, I was in the living room watching TV, and we started talking in there.

I was advised that, after a 15-day period of not reporting it, failure to do so -- that we would be responsible for it. I was okay with that. When it came time for a training that was scheduled to come up for defensive tactics, I informed my supervisor of the injury.

This is an embarrassment to myself, humiliating to be standing in front of you, my department, members of my former department. I ask that you accept the letter of caution that the Director has recommended. I do believe it to be extremely fair.

And in this nature I had started work with the Eddy County Sheriff's Department on November 5th of 2012, where on the first day I had gone out with my lieutenant to do my firearms, my state firearms qual.

And during that time frame, getting up and

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I had gone to the doctor. And the doctor suggested I do some physical therapy to help it go away. I informed him of it. He asked me to write a memo. And I wrote that memo reporting it as an off-duty injury instead of just coming out and saying that it was on duty.

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It went up to my supervisor and it went to the training department. Approximately a week or two later, I was speaking with my lieutenant. And I informed him that I had misreported the injury that I had lied about or that I had wrote the memo and lied about the injury. And at that point he asked me what had happened, what had occurred.

I told him when it happened. And he asked me to write a follow-up memo in reference to it. And I did. I admit I was wrong. I put my integrity at stake. It doesn't matter what anyone else -- I mean it does matter what everybody else thinks.

However, in this particular case, I did not want to be in my own -- my own sense of integrity to be considered a liar. So I came out and I admitted to my lieutenant and my department that I had lied about the initial memo.

I received a disciplinary action from my department for failure to report an injury. I

received a verbal reprimand, a documented verbal reprimand for untruthfulness. I received a 30-hour suspension without pay and was assigned to take an eight-hour ethics class.

I have since then served my 30 hours consecutively within the same pay period. And I am currently working with Ms. Trujillo with the advanced training department at the Law Enforcement Academy in Santa Fe to find or to schedule the next ethics class that is available to me.

I do apologize to the Board, my department, and people that know me as well as my family. This is not an action I take lightly. And this is not what I represent. I ask that you consider or that you accept the letter of caution that I might be able to continue to work for the citizens of New Mexico in the capacity of a law enforcement officer.

And my department, to be in compliance with their disciplinary action, the sheriff wants me to complete an eight-hour course, which only I've been able to find through the Law Enforcement Academy.

And usually the Board does not deal with people commenting at that time. So we won't do that. If you're here for it, we will be making decisions at the end of our closed hearing.

And now we're up to Mr. Ielacqua.

MR. D'AMATO: Ielacqua.

MR. KORN: Ielacqua. And before you begin I did want to say that, as a matter of interest to the Board and to Mr. Ielacqua, I was contacted by someone that would have liked to have been here but couldn't. And I did want to speak on his behalf. And I told him, if he sent me an email, I would read it at least on the record.

And it is from Marshall Katz. He's the Chief of Aviation Police. He was as I learned later a complainant in this matter. And I'll read this email so it's part of the record. "During my tenure as chief with the Albuquerque Aviation Police Department, I was compelled for numerous administrative reasons to terminate three of my employees. Paul Ielacqua unlike the others understood and accepted his discipline.

" As a result we continued our professional friendship, even after his separation from city service. Several years ago Paul applied for a position as an investigator with the Public Defender's Office. I encouraged him to put me down as a reference.

"Once he interviewed, I was contacted by their office and supplied them with an honest evaluation of his history including his ability to identify, field test, and assist in the prosecution of the highest number of DWI arrests in my department.

"I also suspect that they receive hundreds of applications. Nevertheless, Paul was selected and conducts follow-up interviews and investigations as well as trains their respective department employees.

"I am of the firm conviction that Paul Ielacqua has gone through a renaissance or a rebirth. And as a result he would make a fine addition to any police department. In closing, I fully support his reinstatement. Should any Board Members have

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questions, I could be reached at a public service number," which he provides.

So that will become part of our record. And now that I've massacred your name I don't know how many times, would you like to speak or your attorney on your behalf?

MR. D'AMATO: By way of background, Mr. Chair, Members of the Board, in 2008 there was a default order of revocation that was under 99-0281-P signed off by then Chief Sigata December 15, 2008. Since that time -- and this was based on an LEA-90 form making some relatively significant allegations of wrongdoing.

Paul was terminated by Chief Katz back in 2008. And since 2008 Paul has become the Paul that we all knew prior to the incident or the allegations in the LEA-90 form. He is currently employed with the Public Defender's Office as a chief investigator or one of the investigators there I should say.

And I have had the privilege of knowing Paul in a professional capacity, when he was a police officer, opposing him at times in DWI arrests. And you'll have to understand if you're not familiar with the way Albuquerque is laid out.

There is an Albuquerque Aviation Police

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Department, Albuquerque Police Department, Bernalillo County Sheriff's Department all having generally a same locus of DWI searches and arrests.

While Paul was at the airport, he pretty much outpaced both other departments in his DWI arrests. Not only did he make more arrests, he pretty much had a 98 or 99 percent conviction rate. He was dedicated, he was committed, he stood for and practiced on a daily basis everything that this Board hopes all of its certified officers could achieve.

He was in a bad point in his life in 2008, when he engaged in conduct which would support a suspension or revocation. He wants an opportunity to come back and be a police officer again in New Mexico.

Paul will have distributed at the close of what I'm about to tell you a little bit more information that's publicized his arrests, his history as a police officer, and some of the more notoriety, if you would, in his arrests and cases.

I would urge the Board to consider allowing him to be back as a certified sworn police officer with a period of probation to allay any concerns that the Board may have. With that I will turn this over to Mr. Ielacqua.

MR. IELACQUA: Ladies and gentlemen of the

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Board, before we start I would like to hand this out to you. This is just a little history about me. I got in trouble one time in me career of 17 years. I'm on my 17th year. I got in trouble one time.

And I would like to pass this out. This is I think approximately maybe a little more than 30 letters of commendation. I also was in the front page of the Santa Fe New Mexican for being I guess our DWI expert out there. If I may approach, I would like to hand this to you.

MR. KORN: You can give that to Ms. Monique Lopez or Mr. Jones. We'll review that in closed session as well. But please, if you would like to address us, that would be fine.

MR. IELACQUA: I would. It's kind of tough. I'd heard some of the officers talk about their spouses stepping out on them. Unfortunately that happened to me several times. And, in fact, in a year after me not being a police officer, my spouse remarried one of those people.

As a police officer, as a father, and as a husband, I always try to do the right thing. I supported a family of four on a policeman's income for 12 years. I put a wife through college and I worked myself pretty much to death where my health went bad,

gallbladder collapsed, shingles, et cetera.

On her last liaison -- you know, anger gets the best of us. And it comes out in very negative ways. Some in violent behavior, domestic violence. For me it was -- I seeked comfort with a mistress I guess you could say. I mean I didn't have to take care of her. But we were friends. And I stayed with her for five years.

The question would probably be did I have sex on duty. Yes, I did. Approximately about five times a year, maybe 25 times in the five years that I was with her. Her and I are still friends today.

If I sit up here and said that I wished none of that would have ever happened, it would be pretty accurate. But on the other hand, it's made me a stronger person. Because when you wake up in a house with nothing in there because they took it all and you've lost everything that you ever worked for and everything that you ever cared about to include the law enforcement community, which you want your brothers and sisters to respect you. And I used to worry quite a bit about that.

But what I found is being honest, being true to yourself, and being true to that community you get forgiveness. I will apologize for what I've done.

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And I'm here today in front of you wanting to be a police officer again. It's been five years. And I'm still blue.

In my present capacity, I'm very lucky to work at the Public Defender's because I get to work with baby defense attorneys that are not very pro cop. But I get to teach them why officers do what they do, why they act the way they do, and why things happen the way they do.

And I really, really have gotten a positive response and feedback from all of them. One of the next classes I'm going to be putting on for them is use of force. And I'm going to play videos of officers getting killed in the line of duty. So they know why officers do what they do and why they act like they do.

I'm proud of the work I do there. And like I explained to them, they're protecting the Constitution. They have a job to do. And while I as an ex-police officer do include -- I started my career in corrections. I don't judge them.

And I expect the same, that they don't judge me for being an ex-police officer or other officers. And it seems to work out pretty good.

So I'm here today just asking for

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forgiveness. Not only from the Board but from the entire law enforcement community. And that's all I have.

MR. KORN: Thank you, sir. Does the Board have any questions of Mr. Ielacqua? Chief Schultz.

MR. SCHULTZ: Sir, the original incident that occurred back in 2007, the owner of the escort service, did you know him, did you know who he was?

MR. IELACQUA: I know who he is. I don't know him personally.

MR. SCHULTZ: Did you know him at the time? MR. IELACQUA: Yes.

MR. SCHULTZ: So you knew him at the time and you knew he was involved in running an escort service?

MR. IELACQUA: Yes, I did.

MR. SCHULTZ: That's all I have.

MR. KORN: Other board questions. I have a question. And I understand you've talked about your encounters, your sexual encounters. We don't really have the prior Board's indication of why they attributed the revocation that they did.

But I notice in the materials we did get that was -- it seems to make reference to the fact that you were sent to investigate whether illegal activity was going on. And you went there, determined that illegal

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activity was going on, and then reported it was not; is that part of the prior case?

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MR. D'AMATO: And I think, if I may, Mr. Chair, the bottom of page 1, top of page 2 of the Default Order of Revocation, do you have that in front of you?

MR. KORN: I do. But actually, if Mr. Ielacqua is willing to reply, I would like to hear it from him.

MR. D'AMATO: Well, I'm going to reference him to that point. I think that's what you're referring to.

MR. KORN: I would like him to respond to that, if you're willing to have your client do that.

MR. D'AMATO: Of course.

MR. KORN: Sir, would you respond to that? MR. IELACQUA: Initially I was called out to the Wyndham Hotel.

MR. KORN: Well, wait. Just so I get the synopsis of this first, if I read this right, it says that you were called to the hotel to investigate whether illegal activity occurred. That you stayed there a particular period of time and determined it was and then reported it was not. Is that a correct synopsis?

MR. IELACQUA: That is not accurate, no.

MR. IELACQUA: At that time there was no illegal activity. I went up to the room. I listened at the door. I heard some girls giggling and laughing. I heard a male voice. I knocked on the door, identified myself. At that point he opened the

Everyone was fully clothed. I explained to the girls that they needed to leave, that they were not welcome. At that point they exited out. I then told the gentleman that was in the room that they're not welcome here and that I know what he's up to and he knows what he's up to and that it's not going to go on there.

At that point I left. Like I said everybody was fully clothed. I didn't see anything at that point that I felt that was illegal in nature going on that I could effect an arrest. And I went downstairs. And I started talking to the escort girls.

MR. KORN: And also the escort owner? MR. IELACOUA: Not at that point, no. To understand this you have to go back a little bit. That particular -- I can't remember his name. That

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escort owner was starting to frequent the airport area hotels. I did report that to supervisors.

And at one point I even took an MVD picture and I believe I put it -- I can't remember it's been so long. Either in my sergeant's or my chief's box and made them aware. I had gone to day shift for a bit. And then when I came back is when this particular incident happened.

When I went downstairs to talk to the young ladies, the escort ladies. I was curious if it was the same guy. And I asked them who is your boss. And I said is he a big guy with a beard. I didn't know his name at the time. And they said yes. I said, well, tell him Officer Ielacqua was here and I want to talk to him.

MR. KORN: So, sir, when it says that you reported to your supervisors that no suspicious illegal activity was going on, that would be false, that would be a lie, wouldn't it?

MR. IELACQUA: Well, I don't remember saying no suspicious activity. But I do remember saying no illegal activity, because at that point I hadn't seen anything illegal.

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being with the department, I have learned and experienced a lot and continue to learn. Also gained a new family.

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I have a proven track record of following the rules and being a dutiful deputy. My heart is committed to being of service to the community and San Miguel County Sheriff's Department.

During my service I have transported many prisoners, from murderers to juveniles. I have served warrants and other documents, conducted DWI checkpoints, and saturation patrols with integrity and professionalism.

This is not just a job to me but an opportunity to do something meaningful and good for my community. I did not decide to be a deputy because I needed to make an income. I decided to become a deputy because I wanted to make a difference in people's lives. I wanted to be part of the solution, not part of the problem.

I have done my best to make positive changes in my life by going to school and achieving my high school diploma, Associate's in criminal justice, and continuing my education as a full-time student now on my third year in college studying towards my Bachelor's in criminal justice.

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I am currently maintaining a 4.0 GPA. My choice to become a deputy was because I wanted to do something that would show my ability and my potential to help others in their lives to make the right decisions and treat everyone with dignity and respect while following law enforcement protocol.

I have made mistakes in my life as you can see. However, I have fulfilled all my obligations imposed on me by the courts. I would like you, Chairman, Members of the Board, Director, to give me the opportunity and chance to become a law enforcement officer which has always been my dream. Thank you.

MR. MONTANO: Yes. Basically what I'm here for is because I put in a request to attend the certification by waiver program through the State of New Mexico State Academy. I work currently with the Jicarilla Apache Police Department.

I hold a rank of sergeant at that department. I've been with that department a little over four years. I've actually been in law enforcement service for close to five years. I have worked just about all my career with the Jicarilla Apaches. I did work for Rio Arriba County for approximately nine months and then went back to the reservation.

Within your packets I would like to let you know that there are six pieces to that packet. The first is going to contain academy documents that I received from the academy as I was doing my requests. The second is going to be a history from when I was a youngster to today.

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Number three is going to be an incident that happened when I was 18 years old. And this incident is the part of this whole case that is holding me from being able to obtain my certification by waiver. Number four is going to be some pardon documents from the governor's office that I received on this incident.

Number 5 will be 13 letters of character basically from community members, our priest, most of my peers at work, people from the community. Just different letters from different people explaining a little bit about my character within the community. And number six is going to be finally the completed application for the certification by waiver that I had turned in.

Like I say I'm just seeking to be able to attend the certification by waiver. When this whole thing started, I applied for the certification by waiver. And on January 4th I received a letter from Ms. Marisa Tapia and Mr. Shea in reference to my application.

I had been approved to attend the academy for the cert by waiver. I went and appeared at the academy on January 9th. And lo and behold I failed my mile and a half run. So they sent me home.

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I asked Ms. Tapia what do I need to do to get into the next class in August. And she said, well, by looking at your records, the only thing that's going to be expired is your physical. So I said no problem, I'll take care of it.

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So I went back to -- I went back home. I let Sheriff Rodella know about what had happened with my run. He said no problem. We'll go ahead and just take care of it in August.

During that time I just -- I got fed up with the shenanigans that was going on with the Rio Arriba County and I decided to go back to the reservation and work there, if they had me. So I went back and talked to the chief.

And he said sure, come on back, you're an excellent police officer. So he hired me back on. And I explained to him the only thing that I need for the academy is the physical. So he sent me to the physical.

And upon my return Ms. -- I'm not sure if it was Ms. Lopez or Ms. Tapia was still in the office there. And she said, well, it's good except that there has been a discrepancy on your application. So I said okay. Well, can you explain more to me.

So she directed me to talk to Mr. Phil

Gallegos. Apparently he was the one that was taking care of that part of the academy. Upon talking to Mr. Gallegos, he said that on the LEA-6 I had marked that I had been previously convicted of a felony.

I said yes. But if you look at my application, there's also the letter from the governor, there's the pardon certificate from the governor stating that I was pardoned of all my actions and I had paid all my dues, I did everything the courts asked of me.

And he said, well, what you're going to need to do is bring me a case file. And I'll have Director Medina go over the file and he'll make his decision. Well, I didn't hear from him, didn't hear from them, and didn't hear from them.

So I don't remember exactly what date I went back to the academy. And I requested to speak to Mr. Medina personally. Well, Mr. Medina was probably busy. I know from being -- from a background of supervisors, I know that supervisors don't just sit in their office twiddling their thumbs.

Anyway so he couldn't see me that day. But he did instruct his assistant to take some copies of some of the documents and he would get back to me. So a couple days later he sent me a letter stating

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that I was denied. And he stated some codes that he was referring to.

And then I started seeing what I could do to be able to continue my journey in the law enforcement field. I asked again if there was anything that I could do as far as to see if I could get the certification going.

He basically sent me another letter stating that once again he was denying my request. And he did state the opinion from Tom Udall, I believe it's 09-92-02. And it refers to the pardons by the governor.

On the letter he did state a few parts of that opinion. I went into the opinion and I looked at it. And in your packets you'll find there's four different places that I feel that within that opinion it states there that yes, I could possibly be certified by the State Academy Board and by the State Academy to do the certification by waiver.

So within this -- I'll go to the incident now like I say. It happened when I was 18 years old, 35 years ago. The incident that happened was I went with a so-called friend in broad daylight to a house in -- I believe it was in San Miguel County. And my friend used to live there. And we

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would go out there, we would go fishing, stuff like that. We went out there. And one day he said, hey, I need to go pick up some stuff from a friend of mine. So I said, oh, okay, let's go. I figured broad

daylight, you know, no one was going to be doing anything wrong in broad daylight.

Anyway so we go to this house and we approach the house. And he says, well, there's nobody here, but I've got a key to the back door. So he goes around, opens the door, and we go in the house. And I'm just standing there in the living room looking at pictures.

I don't know who lives at this house or any information at all. I'm not even from that community. Anyway the next thing I know he's taking out some kind of a stereo or something like that. And I asked him, well, do you need some help.

And he said no, my friend had purchased this from me but he never paid me for it. So he gave me the key to come and get it, he's out of town. I said fine, no problem. So I just kind of stood there looking around.

The next thing I know a San Miguel County Sheriff's officer is telling me to get on the ground. I tried to explain what had happened, that I was just

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there with my friend. And I had no idea that he had broken into the house.

So anyway so I get arrested. And then after all the hoopla and warrants and everything like that, we do go to court. And apparently my friend or so-called friend was 17 at the time. So he got his sentence and was done with it before my trial even came up.

We did go to court. And he admitted that I had no idea what he was doing. He admitted that I don't know who the guy is. As a matter of fact, I just saw the name, I believe it was on the court statements pertaining to what his name is. I couldn't even tell you where that house is today.

But anyways so I get convicted. I got -- I had four counts on me. One was burglary, one was larceny, one was conspiracy, and one was contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

When it was all said and done, after the courts, the judge said that I was dismissing all of them except for the burglary. He told me the only reason that he was going to charge me with burglary of a dwelling house is because I was in the residence without the owner's permission.

And I said okay. This had been my first

offense. I didn't know what was going on. He gave me -- he sentenced me to a 30-day work release because I was working at the time. And he gave me two years probation.

I did everything I could to do well. There's a letter in that packet stating that I was released from probation early for being an excellent probationer. I have never been in trouble again.

As far as my part, I've never hid this from anyone. Every application I've ever put in I've included this, because I have the pardon to back it up.

The federal government decided it was fine. They let me go through their academy. I graduated with honors. I received the Executive Director's Award through the academy. And I don't believe that after 35 years I should still be punished for this mistake that I made 35 years ago.

The other thing I would like to point out is I believe that I would say probably just about everyone in this room did something dumb when they were kids, you know. Sure, I was just over 18. I was just becoming an adult. And this was my mistake. And I feel that I've paid for it. I have been paying throughout my life with this thing hanging over my

So they denied me graduation. Back in those days I used to say, you know what, I don't need an education. And then after going out into the real life, then I started realizing, yes, I do need these things.

So I believe it was in 1995 I went for a GED and got a diploma because I couldn't get a decent job anywhere. I can't really say why. I just never thought I would need it until then.

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Once this incident came up, I did go to the governor's office. And I talked to Legal Aid, Patricia Cason I believe it is. And I asked her, is there any way to do an expungement, is there any way that I can make this better.

And she said, you know what, sir, you've done everything you can. You've got the highest pardon. The State of New Mexico does not recognize expungements. And she said the only thing I can suggest is that you go in front of the Board.

We note that the current Hearing Officer at his best could only do one a week but as a practice actually does more like one a month. So that means that the backlog now has become either 15 weeks or, in the worst-case scenario, 15 months.

For this reason the Board has concluded that in order to make the efficiency of the Board and to make the Board process go quicker, we are going to look at the opportunity of hiring additional Hearing Officers.

We would note that this would not cost the

LEA any more money because those hearings would be conducted by one Hearing Officer or they could be conducted by five Hearing Officers. It's the same 15 that are outstanding now. So with that background, for the record I

will make a motion. The first motion would be that we nominate and select a committee of Board Members that would be less than a quorum that would be able to contact other Board Members as well as other information that they can cull in order to select Hearing Officers primarily with a background of law enforcement.

We feel -- and again I speak for myself, but I don't think I have opposition on the Board. We feel that a career law enforcement officer that has 15, 20, or 30 years in law enforcement knows how law enforcement officers think, will have the community at heart, and will be able to make proper decisions not based on a vacuum but based rather on a law enforcement career, doing the best thing for the officer and the community.

So, therefore, we will primarily be looking at ex-law enforcement officers or current law enforcement officers that have demonstrated over that period of time an ability to show good judgment under

Some of the things I just want to tell you about is one of the things that Director Medina and I have done since I have taken over the deputy director's job at the Law Enforcement Academy is we have changed the face of what the Law Enforcement Academy is going to do.

We are going to revise how we do business with the satellite academies and how we do business with the chiefs of police, the sheriffs departments, and the sheriffs themselves. We want to be more user-friendly.

We're going to streamline the process of how we put in applications for law enforcement agencies for cert by waivers for the basic academies so that it is a more streamlined process and that you control the things that you need to have done inside that process itself.

We've talked about several things that we need to do. All of it falls within NMAC itself. We're going to stay within the NMAC, we're going to

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And I've talked to a couple Members of the Board. Vice Chair, I would like to ask if there would be a possibility that we might in the future consider doing two Board meetings a quarter for the next two quarters possibly, because there are things that we do need to talk about that are changes we want to make inside the NMAC itself to reduce this academy from a 20-week academy to an 18-week or 16-week academy.

We think we've got a program that we can do that. We want to be able to present that to the Board and do it reasonable so that you understand what we're trying to do and how we're going to do that. We want vou to feel comfortable about the direction we want to take it.

And we can then ensure that we meet all of the requirements that are in the NMAC and what you need as a chief of police or a sheriff or department in the State of New Mexico.

MR. KORN: Thank you, Assistant Director. So are you saying that you would like us to decide today about the two meetings per quarter for the next two quarters?

MR. JONES: Sir, I would like you to consider it for the next meeting. What I would like to do is at the next meeting present to this Board -- which

work the rules within the NMAC.

And I think that what's going to happen is our changing the face of what we do at the New Mexico Law Enforcement Academy is going to make it more conducive for us to put out a better product for those cadets that will be graduating from the satellite academies and through our academy itself.

A couple things we've already changed is, as an example, at this last academy, we added live fire vehicle stops, live fire shooting house, and we've done tactical drills on the range itself. That has never been done in the academy before.

And what we want to do is take those processes that we just changed and change the whole face of the academy with what we're going to do to bring in new cadets and bring those cadets in to train them, to motivate them to doing things that they need to do so that they will be a better cadet when they get on the street for the sheriffs departments and the police departments.

We want to make sure that they have the ability to do that job as a basic police cadet. And when you get them as a police or sheriffs officer, they are able to do the things that you need. Some of this is a pilot program.

this done by October so that, when we restart our classes in January, we can have a new look of what we need to do throughout the State of New Mexico with our

7 satellite academies. 8

And I might add that Sergeant Bode is here from San Juan Community College and we have Angie Byrd here as director of the community college here in Hobbs. It's something that we need to do. We need to change the look of what we're doing and how we do business and do it more streamlined at our academy.

MR. KORN: If the Board were willing to do it perhaps in late May or early June and then the next one in July, would that work with your time frame or would that be too soon for you?

MR. JONES: If that is within the procedures and we can do that, it is not too soon for us, sir, no. sir.

Our timeline that I would like to see aggressively is that we would have the rule changes and we could proceed with this in January of next year to make this happen.

MR. JONES: Yes, sir.

MR. KORN: Okay. So I think with that in mind, it's not really rule changes, it's just picking our brain at a special meeting.

MR. JONES: What I would like to do is present to the Board the things that we are looking at

to make this a 16-week academy, why we would like to make this a 16-week academy and why we can do that. And I think there are a lot of things that we are doing at the Law Enforcement Academy that is duplication of effort.

And how we would go about letting you have the feeling that we can do this and do it succinctly and correctly so that we don't have any lapse of anything that's in the NMAC and that we are capable of training your future police officers in a manner that you would want to have on the street.

MR. KORN: I think Chief Shilling had a comment.

MR. SHILLING: Mr. Vice Chair, I did. I was going to save it for closing comments, but this is an opportune time.

I don't remember when, but it was early on in my Board career here, one of the reasons things are such a mess is it's not that the academy is duplicating efforts necessarily. It's that legislators legislate through law training for law enforcement that is inappropriate, that it should be brought to the Board and adopted by the Board.

And so the academy -- and I know because we have one -- is always trying to play catch-up with

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state statute when they plug in mandatory training in some new child abuse law or something like that. And it has resulted in a lot of duplication of effort.

But my original point I wanted to make is, based on the Deputy Director's comments, what I had said probably a couple years ago is I think we need to get proactive as a Board in educating the legislature about this process.

These warm and fuzzy bills that get passed in the State House with mandatory law enforcement training attached to it, they have absolutely no clue of the impact it has on the academy, on this Board, and every other academy around the state.

And I think what the Deputy Director is talking about is NMAC is a mess. It needs to be cleaned up and reconciled. There's a lot of duplication in there because of what the State House has done.

But I would be happy to spearhead an effort somehow before the next 30-day session next year about trying to educate the legislators about what a train wreck they cause when they legislate mandatory training.

That's what the NMAC rules are for, that's what this Board is for, is to see presentations and

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adopt training for law enforcement. And it has just
created a mess and it's gone by the wayside for too
many years. Thank you.

MR. KORN: I think that's an excellent point I had a small occasion to see how our government works in the State House, and I know just what Chief Shilling is talking about. He's right. And that would be wonderful. So we can talk about that at one of the meetings the next time too.
